Easter is a time of great contrast, a time of both profound sorrow and joyous celebration.



Despite the darkness of that first Good Friday, we as Christians believe that God's rescue plan for humanity was being played out, even though people didn't understand the significance of what was happening at the time. Easter Sunday, by complete contrast, is about light, hope and new beginnings as we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. On that first Easter Sunday, Jesus rose again, meeting his friends face-to-face and bringing them indescribable joy!

The Bible tells us, that over the next 40 days, Jesus appeared to more than 500 people, face-to-face; talking with them, eating with them, laughing with them and encouraging them. For us, the message of Easter is very simple. God offers each of us forgiveness and an opportunity to know him, all because of the death of his son Jesus. Not only that, he also offers us hope – hope for the dark and difficult times in life, but also hope that death is not the end, that one day we will see him face-to-face too.
