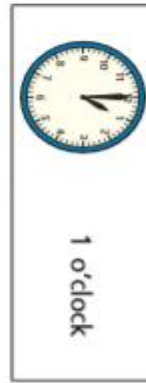
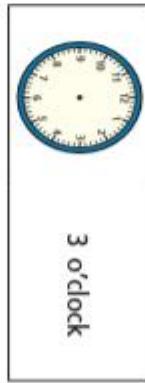

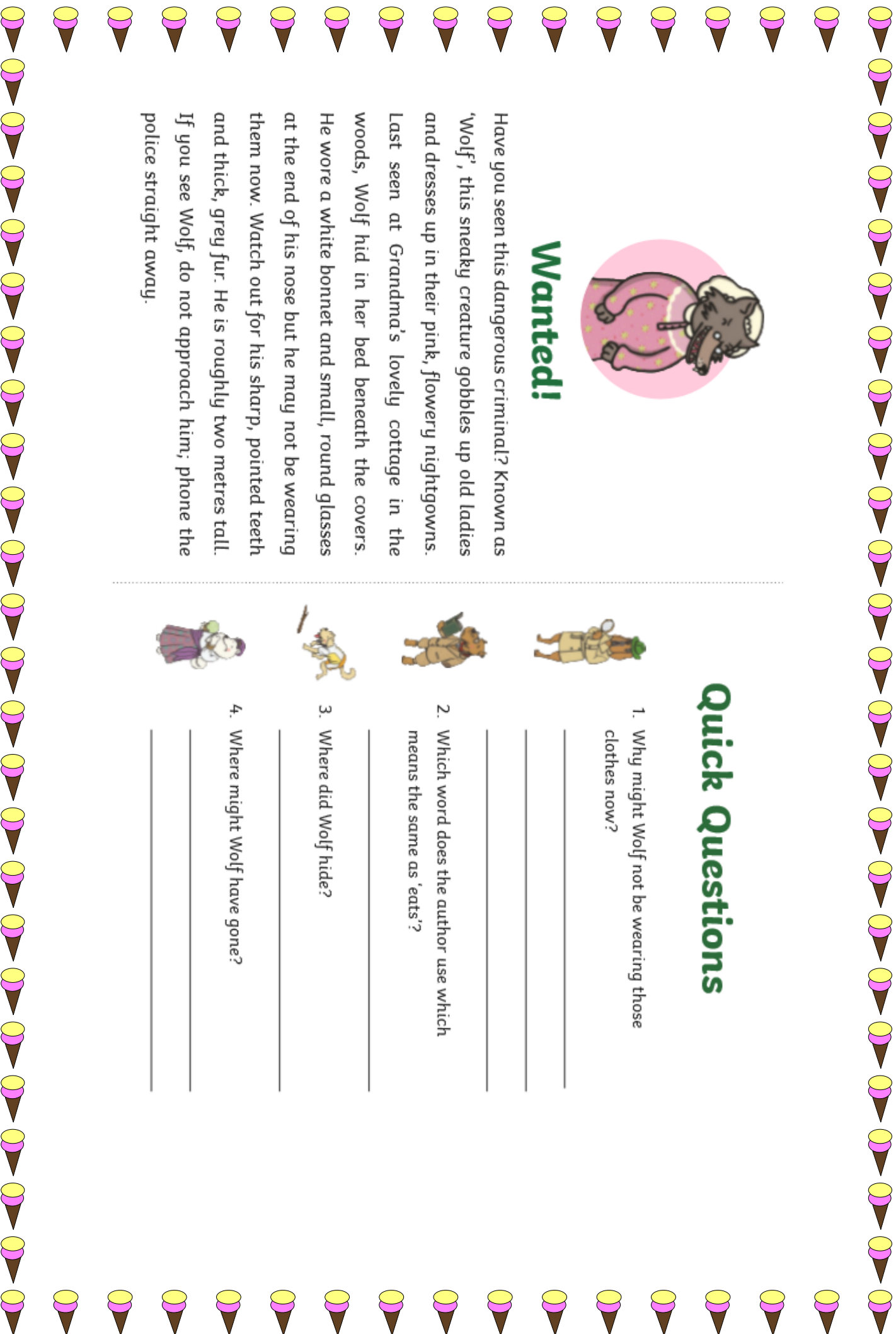
Quick Questions
